Developing this knowledge helps us to notice children's numeracy skills in play and guides us in designing a learning goal and program, acknowledging each child's strengths.



CHILD PROTECTION - BOSS OF YOUR OWN BODY



This term we have been reading a book called "Boss of Your Own Body" which uses simple and powerful words that introduce children to the topic of consent and privacy in their bodies. relation to important to teach children to have a strong and clear voice about their rights so they are building the confidence to speak up when they feel uncomfortable or upset in any understanding situation. An consent and personal space can help create a less violent and safer world. The book says that as a child you are "not the boss of many things, because you are little and still learning" but reinforces an important message about body awareness and self-advocacy stating "But you are the boss of one thing.... You are the boss of your own body!"

BUS POLICY







Please be aware that if you have indicated that you need your child/children to use the kindy bus, you will be required to meet the bus at both pick up and drop off.

You will have to sign your child/children on and off the bus during these times.

Centre staff members are not permitted to leave the bus for any reason other than to assist a child with getting on the bus (and this is only up the bus steps). Staff are not permitted to knock on doors, or meet parents in front yards for the purpose of getting forms signed or for any other reason. It is the responsibility of the person collecting your child from the bus to sign your child/children on and off each day. It is essential that this person be on the authorised contact list and that they be 18 years or over. It is also your responsibility to sign any forms during these times (such as health check forms, ILP's or referral forms).

Failure to walk your child/children to the bus and sign them on and off the bus will mean that your child/children cannot come on the bus, and the bus will leave. You cannot wave from the front door or porch to show that you are present; you must come to the bus to collect your child at the end of the day, if you do not come to the bus, the bus will leave and you will have to collect your child from the centre. We realise that in the past we have allowed families to wave to staff from the front door of the house to show that they are home, however due to new policies these past practices will need to cease immediately. Parents/caregivers will need to be present at the bus for both pick up and drop off and they will need to sign the attendance sheet.

Only parents/caregivers and emergency contacts will be given authority to sign the bus sheet and collect child. If you require someone who is not on the child's emergency contact list to collect child at bus then you will need to contact the Centre and let them know the person's name so that the child can be released to that person. There may be times when staff ask for the authorised person for photo identification. Failure to contact the Centre will mean that your child will be brought back to the kindy and you will have to arrange collection. A contact information sheet will be carried by staff during bus runs and if staff are unsure of parent/caregiver or emergency contact names, they will refer to contact list and ask for verification. We ask that you consider that staff are trying to make sure that your child is safe and that not all staff (especially new staff or staff that do not do bus runs often) are not aware of everyone's faces and so will seek verification often.

Please be advised if there is an occurrence of violence/unsafe behaviour, your child will be excluded from the bus run service. Staff and children need to feel safe at all times

A reminder that the Centre Director reserves the right to exclude children from bus runs if safety is a concern (for example child is not staying in seats or sign in sheet is not getting signed).

If you have any concerns, please feel free to contact the Centre and have a discussion. We want to make the bus run a fun and enjoyable experience for all families and want to keep it as safe as we can.
